DLRA Testing

*** What is the DLRA Testing?**

The DLRA Testing is the drug testing program that will detect illicit drugs in CAMS licenced participants. Safety is the main objective and this will be achieved by the exclusion of participants from DLRA meetings if an illicit drug is detected in their sample.

DLRA Testing will be administered by the DLRA, with samples collected and analysed by an external service provider. The program has similar principles to police roadside drug testing.

*** The Who, What, When, Where, How and Why of Testing**

Who can be tested?

Any DLRA licenced driver, co-driver, entrant, navigator or official (participants).

What happens if an illicit drug is detected in my sample?

You could be excluded from participating in the meeting and may also receive further penalties.

What happens if I refuse to undergo DLRA Testing?

You'll be excluded from participating in the meeting and may also receive further penalties.

When and where will DLRA Testing occur?

It could be at any DLRA meeting.

How will Testing be conducted?

Saliva samples will be collected and 'screened' onsite while you wait

How long does a test take?

About 15 minutes. The DLRA will endeavour to keep the impact to preparations of participants as low as possible.

Why is the DLRA doing this?

Safety. The DLRA aims to provide the safest possible environment for all by excluding participants from meetings if they have an illicit drug detected in their sample.

Illicit Drugs in Motor Sport

*** Don't Risk Your Health And Reputation**

By using illicit drugs, you can seriously impair the way your mind and body function. For motor sport participants, this can have a major impact on your performance and even puts the health and wellbeing of others, including the public at risk. Away from the track, illicit drug use can seriously damage your personal life including work and relationships.

How Do Illicit Drugs Affect You?

Similar to being under the influence of alcohol, your skills and decision making ability are impaired by using illicit drugs. For instance, illicit drugs can:

- increase your nervousness and irritability – making it hard to concentrate
- distort your judgement of time and distance
- cause dizziness or blurred vision
- slow down your decision making and response time
- impair your coordination

What's at risk?

If you use illicit drugs you are risking:

- your health
- the safety of other participants and the public
- the reputation of you, and the DLRA
- your motor sport career aspirations
- your sponsorship deals
- the respect of your peers, family, friends and the motor sport community

*** Remember:**

The best way to protect yourself and others from the impact of illicit drug use is to decide not to use them!

*** Getting help**

If you think you have a problem with drugs, or know someone who may have a problem with drugs, start talking. Talk to a counsellor, a health professional or someone else you can trust, such as a friend or family member.

Through the Illicit Drugs in Sport (IDiS) program, The DLRA in conjunction with the Australian Government, has been educating the motor sport and broader community about the dangers of illicit drugs since 2015.

The DLRA will continue to educate participants on the dangers of illicit drug use and exclude any competitor or official from participating in DLRA meetings if they are impaired by illicit drugs.
